






#### Our Targets For KS5 Students





The contribution that you make impacts significantly upon the whole community. We expect you to take an active role in the achool, which will make this one of the most enjoyable periods Your time in the Sight Form will gazz very quickly, and it is important that you adjust to the demands of 15-19 education very quickly. Your Sight Form tutors and teachers have a vasit amount of experience in helping new Sight Formers to adjust and you should seek out their help as they will always be pleased to provide advice and guidance. You must remember that a key element of 5bth Form life is openness and honesty; if you are experiencing pastoral or scademic difficulties causing you to be behind with deadlines, do not suffer in silence - come and talk to us. Learning is not a passive activity in the Sixth Form. You cannot just turn up to lessons and hope that your teacher will complete the course for you. Only about 40-50% of the weekly workload will be completed in the classroom. The rest is to be undertaken in your supervised study periods and at home. An independent approach to your learning is vital to be successful at this level, and we will help you to learn how to achieve this during your time here. The achool motto - "Together We Learn, Achieve and Succeed" - is a good phrase to learn and remember while studying here.



#### What do we expect from students?

- 100% Attendance & Punctuality
- Letters are sent home after every half term for attendance below 95%
- Letter 1 Target
- Letter 2 Tutor contact and second target
- Letter 3 Parental meeting, contract and final target.
- Students to complete a minimum 36 hours of work a week
- All Y12 students in school for full working days until October data
- 20 minutes late, 3 times a week = 12 lost days!







## **Using Study lessons**

- All students are expected to use the time they are not in lessons to work.
- Some students will be expected to remain in school for full working weeks if they are below target or have a low Independent learning score on their report. First report is published in early October.
- The study support officer will be registering and monitoring attendance to study periods
- When in the study rooms students can bring in your own device. Independent study is the key to success (15 hours in the classroom and 21 hours of independent study)



- To check the sixth form teams' site and your subject team's site on a daily basis and respond to requests posted there



1 hour a week - dedicated to building a student's profile ready for their next steps.




































# **KS5 Sport**

- This year we are looking at new options such as hang!, road cycling, WLB (Amateur boxing)












## **Bursary**

- Hardship bursary- In year change of circumstances




