Used in a sentence:

- •*His work involved helping disruptive students to use their energy in a constructive way.*
- •The teachers encouraged students to use the constructive feedback to improve their work.
- •You should always welcome constructive criticism of your work.

<u>Etymology</u> and historical meaning of the term <u>constructive</u> : Mid 17th cent. (in the sense not obvious): from late Latin *constructivus*, from Latin *construct*- 'heap together', from the verb *construere*, from *con*- 'together' + *struere* 'pile, build'.
