Etymology and historical meaning of the term **rehearsal**

The word "rehearsal" comes from the Latin word "rehearsare," which means "to harrow over again." This term was originally used in the agricultural sense of harrowing a field to prepare it for sowing seeds.

Used in a sentence:

We only had six days of rehearsal before the show.

These training exercises are designed to be a rehearsal for the invasion.

He rehearsed the experiment in his head before his biology examination

We listened to his lengthy rehearsal of the arguments.

- **adjective:** dress, wedding, band, choir
- **verb + rehearsal:** conduct, do, have
- **rehearsal + verb:** take, place, go
- **rehearsal + noun:** hall, room, space
- **Preposition :** at (a/the) rehearsal, during (a/the) rehearsal, in rehearsal
