Etymology and historical meaning of the term esteem.

From Middle English (as a noun in the sense 'worth, reputation'): from Old French *estime* (noun), *estimer* (verb), from Latin *aestimare* 'to estimate'.

Used in a sentence:

1: He was held in great esteem by his class-mates.

2: Over the years, the head teachers had earned great affection

and esteem from their staff and students

3: Please accept this gift as a token of our esteem

4:You need to work hard to build your self esteem

5: Their revision gave them confidence and self-esteem before the examinations
